



BUILD A STORY

In this activity, students learn to identify the parts of a story: introduction (catchy first line), setting, main characters, events, solution/ending.

Reread *The Spunky Caboodle and the Christmas Fadoodle* and as a class identify the parts of this story. Perhaps record the information under the five headings.

Now have some fun in this activity to build a (silly) story. Four pieces of information for each story section have been **provided below (i.e. 4 *Introductions*, 4 *Settings*...etc.)

This activity can be done several different ways in the classroom. Here are a few suggestions:

- A. Divide the students into 5 groups of each story part (i.e., Group A is Introductions, Group B is Settings, Group C is Characters, Group D is Event, Group E is Solution) Within each group, number the students 1, 2, 3, 4

 All of the #1s will read aloud their **piece of the story in order.

 Then, all of the #2s will read aloud their piece of the story in order.

 Continue with #3s and #4s. They have just read 4 silly short stories!!
- B. Put students into **groups of 5**. Within their group have the students identify themselves as a story part: *Introduction, Setting, Character, Event* and *Solution*. Photocopy the story parts **provided below. Cut each section out and give the correct story section to each member of the group. The student with *Introductions* will choose one of the introductions to read aloud. The student with the *Settings* will choose what setting to read. The other members in the group will follow. Since the students will each have 4 options of their part, they can choose what part of their story they want to add.
- C. This is an individual writing activity. Post the five story parts **provided and have the students choose what phrase they like best from each part to create their own silly story. They can print them on paper. Encourage students to add more details to their story to expand it. Remember to add punctuation and missing words to make proper sentences. Add an illustration.
- D. This is an activity for 2 or 3 students at a time. Set up a center. Print each **story part suggestion on printing strips. Colour code them (i.e., print all of the *Introductions* on pink printing strips, etc.). Hang up a sentence pocket chart. Have the children choose a sentence from each category and build a story. Encourage them to read it to their friends. They may want to copy their story down and add an illustration.

Event: (oops, I gave you 8 events instead of 4!!)

- 1. the toys are acting cheeky-freaky
- 2. finds magical dust
- 3. loses their little brother
- 4. turns into a reindeer
- 5. is going to a winter concert
- 6. stuck in a snowbank
- 7. running from an enormous snowball
- 8. lost something precious

Solution:

- 1. get rescued
- 2. must stay in the North Pole making toys
- 3. learn a lesson and feel proud
- 4. forgive their faults and all their fat lies

Juicy Words (or Adjectives)

The author, Shelley O'Brien uses many juicy words in her story. These are describing words, or properly called, adjectives. Adjectives are the colour, number, size, shape, speed, texture, quality of a noun (a person, place or thing). Juicy words make the story interesting and exciting. They allow the reader to picture things more clearly.

Try it. Read this:

I see snow falling.

That's a fine sentence. But, now read this:

I see <mark>big, fluffy</mark> snowflakes falling.

The blue words are the juicy words or adjectives

big: tells you the size of the snowflakes.

fluffy: tells you the texture of the snowflakes.

As a class, generate a list of Juicy Words. Record them on chart paper. Put headings at the top of each list: i.e.,
